## Activity 2: Arithmetic

Now that you've written a few programs, let's take a step back and discuss how to do basic arithmetic. The behavior of Java operators ( $+,-,^{*}, /, \%$ ) depends on the type of data you have.

## Content Learning Objectives

After completing this activity, students should be able to:

- Summarize the benefits of working as a team.
- Evaluate Java expressions that use the \% operator with integers.
- Explain the difference between integer and floating-point division.
- Identify operator precedence for addition, division, and assignment.


## Process Skill Goals

During the activity, students should make progress toward:

- Recognizing mathematical operations based on tables. (Information Processing)


## Model 1 Group vs Team

21. What about subtraction (-) and multiplication (*)? If you subtract or multiply two integers in Java, will the answer always be mathematically correct? Justify your answer.
22. Summarize what you have learned about the difference between integer division and floating-point division.

## Model 4 Order of Operations

Java follows a specific order for math and other operations. For example, multiplication and division take precedence over addition and subtraction. The following table lists several Java operators from highest precedence to lowest precedence.

| Parenthesis | $(~)$ |
| :--- | :--- |
| Unary (positive or negative signs) | +- |
| Multiplicative | $* / \%$ |
| Additive | +- |
| Assignment | $=$ |
